

Inspect your bedroom: knife, flashlight, pill jar, sandwich bag, screwdriver, tweezers, contractor bags




Inspect cracks and crevices near the bed, including floor molding ...




... electrical outlets and switchplate covers ...

... seams on the mattress and boxsprings.




Bed bug evidence









Collect a sample.








Seal insect in a plastic bag ...









Visit a county Extension office.










Learn about bed bug biology.
